Having earned her B.A. from Rutgers University, Dr. Sorin received her M.A. from SUNY Oneonta, and her Ph.D. from SUNY Albany.

She writes, “My particular area of expertise is exhibition development and I continue to enjoy creating exhibitions that address issues of social justice. Using artifacts, art, and documents, museums can teach visitors how to evaluate evidence and determine its veracity, understand the way that American democracy works and when it has failed.”
