Dear Fay:

Re: In the matter of the First Universalist Church of Duanesburg and Vicinity.

This is to acknowledge receipt of your letter of April 30th, also check as per our bill, for which I thank you. Obviously, I have at least a personal satisfaction in knowing that I succeeded in getting a substantial check out of the Cemetery Organization, which the obviously, were not entitled to keep, but regardless of that, and after looking up the law on the question of being able to get possession of the funds for the Convention, I told Fred on several occasions that there was a question of ever being able to do so, and the expenses of litigation would not warrant it.

Believe it or not, as many as four other lawyers, one of them a Surrogate Judge, could not give me any help, and as a matter of fact they counseled with me, and gave me advice, which I did not follow, but followed my own attack and succeeded. And while you may not believe me, and I did not take the time to go into details the other day at the Board Meeting, because as you remember, Louie was in a hurry to get through, permit me to say now that at the base of the whole affair if it had not been for the strategy and "finagling" that I carried on with the opposing attorney, I doubt very much if we would ever have received a cent.

You can put this letter on record, and believe me there is more to it than anyone could ever know. I wonder sometimes why so many matters go astray, when if proper strategy is used more could be accomplished. That was in this case, and even more so in the Zimmerman estate, and some day when I have a chance, you and I can sit down and visit about these two matter, yes, even the Olcott matter, and I think I can satisfy you that there are always two ways of doing a thing, and in these three cases, (if you will permit a personal reference) I think I did the right thing.

However, this is all water over the dam, and I assume that you think that I am just trying to toot my own hor, and I think sometimes that if someone does not toot their own horn, no one will toot it for them.

You ask me to write a brief story of the matter for your files in the Duanesburg case. Technically, yes, but from a practical point of view no story could ever be written that would tell the whole story, and the only story that you are interested in is the legal side, and I believe that if I mail you a complete set of the legal papers, together with the ancient records, that they will speak for themselves, because anyone who reviews these records will quickly grasp the entire story, and in order that you may have a complete file in this case, I am mailing you herewith a copylofetheloriginal petition and attached papers, copy of the minutes and stipulation, and a copy of both court orders, all of which have been properly completed, and disposed of, and by that I mean properly entered and filed. They are a story in themselves.

I am also mailing to you the original Certificate of Incorporation, and a certified copy of the will, together with another ancient memorandum, which came to me through Dr.Leining, and which originally came to him from Mr.Frisbie, and also a hand written copy of the clause of Mr. Swan's will, which of course has no particular value because you have a complete certified copy of the will, in which it is incorporated.

It is this memorandum, the Certificate of Incorporation, a copy of the clause of the will and the original deed, given by Joseph Braman and his wife to the church that Mr. Frisbie requested Dr.Leining to return. Personally, I do not believe that either you or Dr.Leining need to spend a three cent stamp to return them because they are of no value to anyone except the Convention.

The original deed running from Joseph Braman to the Trustees of the Church, and the deed funning from Dr. Leining to the Convention, I am not mailing to you at this time, because I may need them if and when the Convention disposes of the property, which you know we still have, and I will keep them and turn them over to you at such time that the entire matter is disposed of. I believe this completes the entire matter to date.

I am mailing a copy of this letter to Dr.Leining so he will know what disposition has been made of the papers that Mr. Frisbie asked about.
