SCARSDALE—Dr. Henry Reuben Rose, who fell to his death from a room on the sixth floor of Doctors hospital in New York City Tuesday night, had lived, for the last few years, with his daughter, Mrs. Andrew Wilson, Jr., at 401 Fort Hill Road, here. Pastor emeritus of the Universalist Church of the Redeemer in Newark, N.J., he was eighty-three years old.

He had become a patient at the hospital last Friday, suffering from arterio sclerosis.

A trustee of the University of Newark, Dr. Rose had been, for 25 years, vice president of the Newark Bureau of Associated Charities.

Besides his daughter, he is survived by his wife, Mrs. Ida Louise Jones Rose; two sons, Henry B. and Dr. Kenneth Rose, and a brother, the Rev. William Wallace Rose [also a Universalist clergyman].

DR. HENRY R. ROSE

The death of Dr. Henry R. Rose occurred in the home of his daughter in Scarsdale on January 24, in his eighty-third year. He was minister of the Universalist church in Newark, N.J., 1898-1928, and was one of our outstanding clergymen. He was a graduate of Tufts College in 1891 and his first pastorates were in Portsmouth, N.H. and Auburn, Me. He was the author of the following books: "Good Sense in Religion," "The Outside of the Cup," "If I Were Twenty-one," "Hungerings of the Human Soul" and "The Road to Happiness." His collection of travel talks and plays illustrated with lantern slides was used by many churches for Sunday evening services. During the past twenty years, he served as minister and interim in the churches at St. Petersburg, Fla.; Haverhill, Mass.; Church of Our Father [First Universalist], Brooklyn and the Church of the Divine Paternity [Fourth Universalist] in New York City. He was accorded honorary degrees by Tufts College and St. Lawrence University.

Dr. Rose is survived by his wife, a daughter, two sons and a brother, Dr. William Wallace Rose of Lynn, Mass. [formerly of Rochester, NY]. The memorial service was conducted in the church at East Orange, N.J., on January 27 by the Rev. Raymond J. Baughan, minister and Dr. Benjamin B. Hersey of the Church of the Divine Paternity of New York City.
