In Cortlandville, Cortland Co., Oct. 21st, Mr. Mead Merrill, aged 89 years and (2?) months. Mead Merrill was one of the early settlers in what is now the corporation of Cortland. He lived near Port Watson and made many permanent improvements in that section. He built a saw-mill there which was in operation in 1816 and about the year 1820, or earlier, erected the substantial house recently owned and occupied by Frederick Conable. Mr. Merrill is credited by Mr. Ballard, in his published Reminiscences, as being the leader of the Federal political party until its dissolution. He was appointed surrogate in the spring of 1810 and county clerk in 1813. Mr. Merrill was a strong Universalist in religious belief, and it was largely by his efforts that the cobble-stone church was erected here.
