Annie Miller, Active in Hospital Work

VALLEY STREAM—Services were held today for Annie L. Miller, who for half a century was a prominent figure in civic work on the South Shore. She died Monday night.

Miss Miller spent her last hours in Jamaica Hospital although she had devoted many years of her life in the interests of the South Nassau Communities Hospital at Oceanside. She fell in her home at 224 Merrick road a week ago and the physician called in, because of his affiliation with Jamaica Hospital, ordered her removal to that institution. Death was attributed to a heart attack, induced by shock of the injury.

The funeral was in the home that vice president of Chopin [Chapin] Home, Jamaica, shared. Officiating were the Rev. Frank Oliver Hall of the Divine Fraternity [Paternity: Fourth Universalist], Manhattan, and the Rev. J.
