WILLARD MUNGER
Death Causes General and Sincere Regret

Dolgeville, Aug. 9—The death of Willard Munger has occasioned grief in every part of this village. While it was known that he was ill, never having recovered from a severe attack of pneumonia of last winter, it was not thought that the serious complications of the heart which caused his death would ensue. Ray Munger, his son, had been told that his father's illness was slight and had started on a vacation to be spent in South Otselie, when he was notified at Syracuse, but was unable to reach here before the father's death. Miss Grace Munger is visiting relatives in Harvard, Ill., and is expected here during the day.

Mr. Munger was born in the town of Salisbury on what is now called the Charles Bauder farm and lived [there] during his early life. He was joined in wedlock to Miss Eugenia Kibbe in 1884 and during the same year they removed to Harvard, Ill., at which place they remained [until?] the past nine years, which have been spent in this village.

Mr. Munger was a respected and valuable employe[e] of the Dolgeville Felt Shoe Company. In politics he was a staunch Republican. While in Illinois he joined the Modern Woodmen, the Mystic Workers and the Supreme Court of Honor, in the Harvard branches of which lodges he retained his membership until the end.

The funeral will be held at the late home to-morrow afternoon and interment will be made in the local cemetery. The Rev. M. G. Folsom of the Universalist Church will officiate.
