DIED.

In Adams, Jefferson co. 8th inst. after a lingering sickness, of consumption, Mrs. MARY JANE PENNEY, consort of Mr. Grove Penney, and daughter of Mr. John R. Ludlow, of this place, aged 20. Thus, within the short space of three months, Mr. Penney has been called to part with two promising children and an amiable wife.

Mrs. P. for several years has been an unwavering believer in the final holiness and happiness of the whole family of man, through the merits and mediation of a crucified Saviour. She found a peculiar support and comfort from the heart cheering influence of this faith, under the loss of her children, and in her last trying sickness; during the whole of which time she uttered no complaint nor murmur against her lot. She died in the full possession of her reason and the triumphs of her faith, bade an affectionate farewell to her husband and friends, telling them she should [would] hereafter meet them all again, in perfect bliss, with the whole human family.

Her remains were taken to the church on Saturday the 10th, and agreeable to her dying request, her funeral services were attended by Rev. Pitt Morse, of Watertown, who delivered a discourse adapted to the occasion, from the following words, "Though he slay me, yet I will trust in him."
