Besides the sons he leaves his mother, Mrs. John Lidell, and a little grandson. Will Pratt, as he was familiarly called, was a person who will be missed everywhere. Of a genial and happy disposition, his cheery whistle and ready repartee brightened the world around him. He was a handy man, able to turn his hand to almost anything, and willing and obliging. For several years after his marriage he worked farms, then bought a home in the village and did pallating and paper hanging, and for the past three years has worked for R. L. Holbrook in the coal and feed business. He was a valued member of the Universalist choir. The funeral will be held Wednesday afternoon, with prayer at the house at 2, and Masonic service at the Universalist church at 2:30. Interment in the village cemetery. Rev. Charles Kramer will conduct the service.
