Interfaith Hospitality Network is a national organization whose purpose is to help homeless families regain sustainable independence. It has done so for 18 years through more than 100 local networks, including ones in Rochester and Buffalo. First Universalist Church is a member of the Rochester area network.

A full time social worker provides case management during normal working hours. Meals and overnight facilities are offered by religious congregations that take turns hosting families in their building.

The workshop will describe the program and the work that has been done in Rochester over the past three years, followed by open discussion.

6. The Journals of John Mather Austin Rev. Ken and Audrey Mochel; Karen Dau, archivist of the NYSCU.
