

FLOCK BUYS NEW BLDG.; SELLS ITS GREENPOINT HOME

Church of Christ Takes North Henry Street Property For \$5,000.

Members of the Second Church of Christ, Disciples, who have been worshipping for many years in the frame church building on Humboldt point, are shortly to occupy a new street, near Nassau avenue, Green—[line omitted] church home.

Within a few weeks, it is expected, the congregation will meet in the church structure at 199-201 North Henry street, formerly the home of the Third Universalist Church of Greenpoint.

The Church of Christ purchased the former Universalist Church property. It is planned to renovate and re-decorate the building thoroughly.

The congregation will take title to the property on October 1. The alterations and repairs, made necessary by the continued vacancy of the North Henry street structure, will be started forthwith, it has been announced.

New cement walks are to be constructed in front of and around the building, and the structure will be repainted and redecorated within. A considerable sum will be expended for this purpose, it is said.

The Church of Christ disposed of its property on Humboldt street, receiving for the frame church building and brick parsonage adjoining it, the sum of \$9,000.

The price reported to have been paid for the North Henry street property is \$5,000. Irad Lane of Nassau avenue negotiated the sale.

The purchaser of record is Harry Goodman of 720 Humboldt street. No announcement has as yet been made of what the two structures are to be used for.

The contract for the sale of the church was signed on Monday by William F. Lantry, as trustee and secretary of the Church of Christ and Mr. Goodman.

The Church of Christ is today in better condition from a financial point of view than it has been in some time.

The Rev. Lyman D. Page is the pastor. The various church societies are to co-operate this fall in waging a determined and enthusiastic campaign to raise a fund to be expended in putting the new church home into good condition.

Leaders in the movement will set out to raise several thousands of dollars. A committee which will attend to the details of having the alterations made and the decorating done consists of John Fraser, Fred Nichols, George Brown, J. J. Demarest and William F. Lantry.
