

FOR A NEW CHURCH
Site Bought by the Church of the Good Tidings—
Present Site Sold to Hebrew Congregation

Lots have been purchased by the Church of the Good Tidings (Fourth Universalist Society), through H. D. Wilson, for a new church. These lots are in one of the most desirable localities in Brooklyn, on the southwest corner of Stuyvesant avenue and Madison street. The plot is 60x100 feet. The residents of the neighborhood are delighted that a church is to be erected there, and it is understood that they have expressed their willingness to contribute to the building fund.

It is the intention of the society to break ground as soon as all arrangements can be perfected, and erect a church that shall be modern in every way, to cost in the neighborhood of \$50,000.

The present edifice of the Church of the Good Tidings has been sold to the Congregation Shaari Zedek, now worshipping in Stanwix Hall. Possession will be given during the early part of April, but arrangements have been made by which the Fourth Universalist Society will also hold its services there until such time as the new church, or a part of it at least, shall have been completed. The pastor, the Rev. Charles R. East, has been here for three years, and he has accomplished a great deal of good work. It has been felt for some time that it was desirable to build a church in a new location, as the present situation, in the middle of the block on Quincy street, between Stuyvesant and Reid avenues, did not tend to the growth of the church, although excellent work has been done and is being done.

The building committee is made up as follows: The Rev. Charles R. East, chairman; George O. Revere, J. B. Frothingham, Peter Stephen, Osmore Webb, W. H. Harden, Horace Dwyer and Charles W. Gibbs.

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
