Universalists Incorporated

The Universalists Society at Carthage have incorporated under the name of the first Universalist Church of Carthage. A meeting was held by the Society Monday evening and the following officers elected: G. F. Ullman and Peter LaRock were chosen trustees for one year; Lalor Sarvey and W. D. Ball for two years; A. E. Kilby and James Brownell for three years; and C. P. McDonald secretary and treasurer. The lady members of the congregation have organized a society to be known as the Susan B. Brough Aid Society of the Carthage Universalist church and selected the following officers: President, Mrs. Lalor Sarvey; vice president, Mrs. Ed. Aldrich; secretary and treasurer, Mrs. Guy Penniman. It is hoped by the members and friends of the society that another summer may witness the erection of a handsome little church edifice on the site recently purchased by the society on School street.

In the future the Universalist church of Carthage will hold regular Sunday evening services in the chapel on School street. The pastor, A. K. Fiske of St. Lawrence University, announces a series of sermons, and the first sermon in the series was preached last Sunday evening, subject: "The Universal God." He announces the remainder of the series as follows: Oct. 29, Subject: "The Universal Christ." Nov. 5, subject: "The Universal Church." These sermons will also be preached at Natural Bridge where services are held every Sunday morning at 11 o'clock.

A committee is soliciting subscriptions for a fund with which to build a new Universalist church in Carthage and has already received much encouragement. It is contemplated building a house costing about \$5,000, and it is believed the amount will be pledged before long. The society owns a lot on School street between State and West.

To Build New Church

The Universalist society of Carthage has elected as building committee Hon. A. E. Kilby, James P. Brownell and John Barber. Plans for a church were submitted by Mr. Brownell, of the firm of Eaton & Brownell, which plans were accepted subject to the recommendation of the building committee.

A resolution was passed empowering the committee to let the contract for the building and recommending that material be procured during the winter and the commencement of actual building operations as soon as weather conditions permit in the spring. The plans call for a stone structure with a seating capacity of 250.
