MRS. ALICE F. ALMY

Friendship, Feb. 24.—Mrs. Alice French Almy, widow of Albert N. Almy, for twenty years a resident of Friendship, passed away Saturday evening after an illness of several weeks. Mrs. Almy was seventy-eight years old. She was born in Rehobeth [sic], Mass., April 18, 1851.

Surviving her are two daughters, Mrs. Henry C. Almy, West Main street, at whose home she died, and Mrs. Richard Polhamous, Dobbs Ferry, N.Y., two sons, Willis E. Almy, North Stonington, Conn., and Howard F. French, New Rochelle, N.Y., [and] three grandchildren.

The body will be removed this evening to Pawtucket, R.I., where burial will be in Riverside Cemetery, Tuesday. Prayer services will be held at the home this afternoon at five o'clock. The Rev. Nellie Alvord of the Universalist Church will officiate.

ALICE FRENCH ALMY

Alice French Almy, widow of Albert Nelson Almy, died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. H. C. Almy, West Main Street, Saturday evening, February 22nd, 1930, at 6:30 o'clock.

Alice French, one of a family of five children, was born April 17th, 1851, in Rehobeth [Rehoboth], Mass., and until the year 1919, made her home in Pawtucket, R.I., after which time, she removed to Friendship, N.Y., where the remaining twenty years of her life was [sic] spent.

Had Mrs. Almy lived until April 17, she would have been 79 years of age.

A short prayer service, conducted by the Rev. Nellie Alvord of the Universalist Church, was held at the home Monday afternoon at 5 o'clock after which, the remains were taken to Pawtucket, R.I., for interment in Riverside cemetery on Tuesday.

During the years spent in Friendship, Mrs. Almy endeared herself to a large circle of friends, and her everyday life evinced a true christian character, full of quiet dignity and gentleness of spirit.

Gracious hospitality was extended to all her friends, and her love for her immediate family, and those near and dear to her, was manifested on every hand.

She leaves as a heritage to those who knew her best, enrichment of life, and a lasting influence which can never die.

Mrs. Almy is survived by two sons and two daughters, Howard F. Almy of New Rochelle, N.Y., Willis E. Almy of North Stonington, Conn., Mrs. Richard Polhamus, Dobbs Ferry, N.Y., and Mrs. Henry C. Almy of Friendship, N.Y.; one brother, Lyman C. French of Dobbs Ferry, N.Y., also three grandchildren, Alice and Richard Polhamus and Howard Almy, Jr.
