She was a member of his society and sang in the choir—the first Universalist society he ever organized. She did not hesitate to identify herself with that little band of believers in God's impartial goodness, although there was strong prejudice against it and most of her young associates were of an opposite faith. She *believed* in Universalism, and was true to her convictions. Her mother was of that faith and belonged to the society, but her father, I believe, belonged to no religious order. When she became conscious that death was approaching, she said she did not fear to die: she called her friends around her and bade them farewell. In taking leave of her parents, she said that if spirits were permitted to return, she would come back and watch over them. wished them to tell all her friends to prepare to meet her in heaven. And thus she departed, full of trust and hope, with a cheerful and resigned spirit. Her funeral services were conducted by Rev. A. Tibbetts, who preached an able and comforting sermon on the occasion. I write this obituary notice at the request of her parents. May the Lord bless and sustain them through the brief interval, till they are permitted to meet the bright spirit of their dear Lucy in the heavenly home.
