DEATHS.

In Stafford, on the 8th of January last, of a pulmonary complaint, Mrs. *Hannah*, wife of J. Bostwick, in the 27th year of her age. Though afflicted for several months with the most distressing sickness, yet she evinced great fortitude and resignation. Not a complaint, not a murmur nor ungrateful refection passed her lips. It is due to her memory to say that she lived the life, and died the death of a Christian. A short time previous to her confinement, she expressed her intention of uniting with the Universalist society in that place, to which she manifested an unusual attachment, often observing that their meetings were the most happy and delightful she ever attended. Happy in the enjoyment of Gospel faith, she left a kind and affectionate husband and three small children, with numerous relatives and friends, to mourn her loss. The funeral services were attended by a large concourse of people at the brick Meetinghouse in East Bethany, on the following day, to which the consolations of the Gospel were administered by the writer, from 2 Cor. v:1.
