DEATH OF GEORGE H. BRAYBROOK MOURNED BY MANY

Dolgeville, April 12.—George H. Braybrook died yesterday at his home in North Main street as a result of a stroke of paralysis which he sustained Thursday night, while in the performance of his duties as assistant chief of police. Mr. Braybrook had been appointed to the position at the annual meeting of the Village Board recently and went on duty Thursday night for the first time, after a period of several weeks' illness. He was in the Spofford Hose rooms for a few moments at a late hour and while there complained of not feeling well. He went out and a few minutes later was found seated on the steps at the office of Dr. Barney, which he had apparently tried to reach. He was taken inside for treatment and was later removed to his home, where his condition rapidly grew worse until the end.

Mr. Braybrook was born in Fairfield 59 years ago last November and was the son of William Braybrook. He resided in Fairfield in his earlier years, coming to this village 33 years ago. For five years he was chief of police of the village, fulfilling his duties in an able and conscientious manner. He was a man who enjoyed the respect of the community and who was held in the highest regard for his worthy character and for his amiable, whole-hearted personality. In 1889 the deceased was united in marriage to Miss Matilda Bliss. He is survived by his wife, by a daughter, Emma Jean Braybrook, who is assistant superintendent of the Emergency Hospital at Herkimer, and by three brothers, William and Charles Braybrook of Middleville and Martin of Ilion. The funeral will be held from the late home at 2:30 o'clock Sunday afternoon, the Rev. C. A. Moulton of the Universalist Church officiating, and interment will be made in the local cemetery.
