DEATHS.

In Chittenango, N.Y., Feb. 5th, 1859, Mrs. LOUISE, wife of Dr. Hamilton Brockway, and daughter of the late Colonel John Hiscock, of Ogden, aged 28 years. Mrs. Brockway had lately removed with her husband (who engaged in the business of Dentistry in Chittenango) from Rochester, N.Y., where she was married a little more than two years since, and where, for a year previous to her leaving she acted as Assistant Superintendent in the Universalist Sunday School. She was a lady of excellent education, of refined taste and manners, and thus she gradually won her way to the confidence and esteem of all who knew her. In company with several others she united with the Universalist church in Rochester nearly a twelve-month ago; and thus, while she honored her Saviour by a public espousal of his cause, she maintained that honor by a noble and well ordered life. After such a description of her position and character, it is unnecessary to say that her departure from this world has caused a deep and widespread sorrow. Having just settled in their new home, and having received the congratulations and the kindest attention of their new friends, she and her husband looked forward with bright anticipations to a long life of happiness. But a great change was suddenly wrought. She was sick hardly a week, and suffered greatly, when death closed the scene. A devoted mother [Orpha Wilmot Hiscock] stood over her from first to last, a husband and other kind friends did all in their power, but were compelled to yield to the wiser will of God. Her funeral was attended at Spencerport, N.Y., by a large assembly of people (several went up from Rochester), where religious services were conducted by the writer, assisted by the Rev. Mr. Dill, Presbyterian, who kindly opened his church for the occasion. May the Lord bless all who mourn.
