DEATHS.

In Ridgeway, November 20th, Mr. ALMOND D. BROWN, in the 26th year of his age. Br. Brown was a member of the Universalist society in this town, and a consistent and firm believer in the doctrine of universal redemption. Though afflicted for some time with a disease that was supposed to be incurable, yet he bore the same with great patience and resignation. He was visited in his last days by many who were extremely anxious to destroy his faith in Universalism, and who employed the usual means to effect a change in his belief; but all their prayers and tears and doubts availed them nothing—nothing but another confirmation of the supporting power of universal grace in the hour of death. On being informed that he could not probably survive but a short time, he called his companion to his bedside, and exhorted her to read and believe, Heb. viii: 10, 11, 12. Having given directions pertaining to the interests of his wife and two children, he departed in peace for the spirit land. The grace of God as revealed in the second covenant was exhibited to the mourning circle, and [to] a large congregation of people who assembled at the funeral on the 22d, by the writer.
