## HORACE L. BURNSIDE

On Saturday morning at 11:15, Horace L. Burnside, aged 75, a well-known farmer and lumberman of Maryland, died at his home on the Oneonta-Albany road near the village of Cooperstown Junction. The death was caused by Bright's disease and complications, Mr. Burnside having been seriously ill for three months and confined to his home for the past month.

He was born January 5th, 1845, on the old Burnside homestead near his late residence, the third son of Everett Sigsbee and Catharine (Spencer) Burnside. Later in life, he moved to the present residence. In 1910, Mr. Burnside was married at Schenevus to Mrs. Ella Kildee, a widow of that town. The deceased is survived by his widow, a nine year old daughter, Hazel, and a brother, B. S. Burnside of the town of Maryland. A niece, Mrs. F. M. Campbell, resides in this city, and a nephew, Rusell [sic] B. Burnside, is now residing in New York.

During [his] lifetime, Mr. Burnside followed the occupations of farming and lumbering. He was a senior member of the firm of Burnside Brothers, dealers in lumber. When a boy, he studied at Milford and Westford High schools, afterward attending the Delaware Literary Institute at Franklin. He was a member and for many years a trustee and clerk of the Universalist church of Cooperstown Junction.

The funeral will be held at the home Wednesday afternoon. Rev. Mr. [Charles] Kramer, pastor of the Universalist church at Cooperstown, will officiate and burial will be at the Spencer cemetery, Cooperstown Junction. Mr. Burnside was an earnest Christian, a man widely known and well liked. Many friends will greatly regret his death.
