A. G. CARD, 48, BUILDER OF CANAL, DIES

Albert George Card, 48, builder of the barge canal terminal and harbor in Syracuse, and descendant of pre-revolutionary war settlers in Central New York, died Friday morning after a prolonged illness at his home at 903 Rugby road.

Mr. Card was an engineer and had served the state as state engineer at Rome and also a number of cities and other municipalities on various construction projects. For the past several he has been engaged in private practice with offices in the O.S.C.B. building.

Mr. Card was born March 26, 1883 at Freeville, son of George T. and Josephine Card, pioneer Tompkins County residents. He was married in 1907 at Philadelphia to Edna L. Caldwell and went to Rome where he was state engineer on the barge canal.

Coming to Syracuse in 1912 at the time the Syracuse barge canal office was opened he was named chief engineer in charge of construction work. Since 1923 he has been engaged in private practice here. At various times he has served the villages of East Syracuse, Liverpool and other communities.

He was a member of the Citizens' Club, Technology Club, Rotary Club, American Association of Engineers, president of the Syracuse Association of civil engineers and surveyors, a member of the State Sewage Works Association and the New York State Society of Professional Engineers and Surveyors. He was also a member of the First Universalist Church of Syracuse.

Besides his widow he is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. George T. Card, of Homer, and a nephew and a niece, Everett and Alma Donaldson, of Detroit.

Funeral services will be held Sunday morning at 10:30 o'clock at the home with interment at Philadelphia, N.Y.
