LYNN CASE, 82, DIES LAST WEEK AT HOME ON MORRIS TRACT

Lynn Case, 82, a resident of the town of Lyme for the past 75 years, died on Tuesday evening of last week at his home on the Upper Morris Tract, about a mile from the village of Chaumont. He had been in failing health for the past two months and confined to his bed for about three weeks.

Mr. Case was injured last fall when the seat on the plow, on which he was riding, broke and he fell to the ground. He continued to work about his farm until his condition became such that he was taken to the Mercy hospital. X-ray pictures revealed he had suffered a broken vertebra when he fell from the plow.

Funeral services were held at the family home Friday afternoon at 2:30 with Rev. H. H. Niles, pastor of All Souls Universalist church, Watertown, officiating. Burial was made in the Brownville cemetery.

Mr. Case was born July 21, 1858 in a log cabin in the town of Clayton between Depauville and Lafargeville. He resided there for a time and then moved with his parents to Reynolds Corners. They lived there for two years and then moved to a nearby farm and then purchased the farm on which Mr. Case lived in 1865.

Mr. Case was well known throughout this section of the county, operating a threshing machine for over 60 years. He was also well known as a well digger, having operated an outfit for years.

He married Miss Lucy Weaver on October 31, 1883. The ceremony was performed in Watertown by the Rev. Lutheran [Luther] Rice, a Universalist minister. Following their marriage, the couple made their home in the town of Lyme where Mr. Case had since resided.

Surviving are his widow, one daughter, Mrs. Florence Gonseth, who makes her home with her parents; Roy Case, a son, who resides on a nearby farm; six grandchildren and one great-grandson.
