C. FRANK CHAPMAN
PROMINENT MAYVILLE ATTORNEY DIED WEDNESDAY NIGHT

Mayville, Aug. 6.—Attorney C. Frank Chapman of this village, who after being ill for several days was taken to the General hospital at Buffalo, N.Y., Tuesday evening, died there last night. His two sons, Leo and Dr. Charles Chapman were with him when the end came. He was 63 years, five months and 13 days old.

Mr. Chapman was born at Woodstock, Conn., but came to Centralia in this county when four years old. He attended school at Mayville and studied law in the office of Obed Edson, at Centralia. He graduated from the Albany Law School in 1876. He practiced law in St. Clairville for some years, spent six years on the old homestead at Stockton and came to Mayville about 18 years ago. He has practiced law here ever since.

On May 25, 1881 he married Fannie S. Morris of Mayville who survives him. He is also survived by four children, Leo L., Lena M., Anna M., and Dr. Charles T. Chapman.

He was president of the village board of Mayville and of the Mayville board of education. He served several terms on the board of supervisors and represent Charlotte and Stockton. The funeral announcements will be made later.

Mayville, Aug. 10.—One of the largest attended funerals held in Mayville in a long time was that of C. Frank Chapman, held from his late home on Erie street at 3:30 Saturday afternoon, Rev. J. [James] M. Payson [Universalist] of Canton, N.Y., who married Mr. and Mrs. Chapman 33 years ago, officiated, assisted by Rev. W. G. Price, pastor of the Sherman Universalist church. There was an unusually large floral display including floral pieces from the Mayville attorneys, Centralia grange, men of the Swetland block, the whist club, Girls Friendly Society and many others. The bearers were Dr. Charles T. Chapman, Leo Chapman, Dwight E. Morris, Frank Plato, Fred Plato, William Wheelock. There were more than three score of persons from out of town in attendance. The remains were interred in the Chautauqua cemetery.
