Following a prolonged illness, Mariamnie Pepper, widow of the Rev. Orello Cone died late Friday afternoon at the home of Mrs. James Dunn, 1115 City street. Mrs. Cone had been under the care of a nurse for the last three or four years. Her illness became critical about a week ago.

Mariamnie Pepper was born in Little Falls March 22, 1839, a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. L. F. Pepper. Her husband was a Universalist clergyman and was connected with the theological department of St. Lawrence University for many years. Later he was president of Buchtel College at Akron Ohio for 16 years. He died 16 years ago and a year or two later Mrs. Cone came to this city and had since resided here. She was a member of the Universalist Church.

She leaves one son, Edwin F. Cone, associate editor of the Iron Co of New York; one sister, Mrs. John Parker of Utica; one brother, William Pepper of Portsmouth, O., formerly of Utica, and several nieces of nephews of this city and Syracuse.

FUNERAL OF MRS. ORELLO CONE IS HELD AT CANTON  
HUSBAND FORMERLY PROFESSOR IN ST. LAWRENCE UNIVERSITY

Canton, Oct. 10.—The funeral of Mrs. Orello Cone was held from the Fisher Chapel yesterday afternoon at three, with Dr. Richard Eddy Sykes officiating. Mrs. Cone died in Utica.

Mrs. Cone's husband was Orello Cone, D.D. From 1865 to 1880, Dr. Cone was Craig professor of the Biblical languages and literature in St. Lawrence University. In 1880 he went to Buchtel college to serve as president, which position he held until 1896 when he returned to St. Lawrence to become Richardson professor of the Biblical theology which position he held until 1906, when he retired. Mrs. Cone was formerly Miss [Mariamnie Nye] Pepper of Little Falls.

The remains arrived Saturday evening. Interment was made at Evergreen cemetery.
