Mrs. Jerome P. Crim

Mrs. Jerome P. Crim of this village died Tuesday evening at her home on Church street after a very short illness, prior to which she seemed in splendid health and a prototype of vigor. Mrs. Crim had been a resident here for many years and her intellectuality and helpfulness have been much appreciated. For many years she was a member of the choir in the First Universalist Church here, and had also been the admirable superintendent of the church Sunday school for several years, being in office at the time of her death. Her work in the church has been indefatigable and very helpful and the society will miss her more than can be estimated now. She is survived by her husband, a son, LeRoy, an electrician at the power plant at Colliersville, N.Y., and two daughters, Adelaide, a teacher in the schools of Brooklyn, and Blanche, an instructor in physical culture in Milwaukee. To them in thus time of terrible bereavement the sympathy of the whole community is extended. The untimely death of Mrs. Crim comes as a distinct shock to everyone in the village, as only last week she was apparently in the best of health.

The deceased was born in Cherry Valley, N.Y., June 20th, 1856, and was married to Jerome Crim Jan. 1st, 1877, previous to which she had resided on Schermerhorn St. in Brooklyn and while there was a member of Beecher's church. Mr. and Mrs. Crim have resided in this village for twenty-five years and their home here has been a very happy one. The remains may be viewed at the Crim residence on Thursday p.m., the funeral occurring there on Friday morning at ten o'clock.
