PAVILION

At 2 p.m. Monday, 5th inst., occurred the funeral of Mr. George Dauchy, at his late residence on the Transit road. The interment was in the new cemetery. The day was wild and stormy, very cold, but the attendance was very large—all the neighborhood and very many from the village, besides Rev. M. D. Shumway [Universalist], of Le Roy, officiated the relatives. giving a written discourse. Rev. E. J. Whitney, G. D. Whitney and son sang a selection by request of Mrs. Dauchy, their sister. Mr. Dauchy was born in Scipio, N.Y., Aug. 16, 1832. His parents were Smith and Sarah Mead Dauchy. A portion of his life he spent in the employ of the N.Y.C.R.R. With that exception, since he was five years old he has lived upon the farm where he died. His sister, Mrs. Sarah J. Bond, is now the sole survivor of the family. Mr. Dauchy was married to Mary K. Whitney Feb. 21st, 1865. They have a son, Grove Whitney Dauchy, and a daughter, Nellie Eleanor, who is the primary teacher in our village school. He was a very intelligent man, well read, and deeply interested in politics, particularly on the tariff question, and many were the discussions in which he has figured in our village places of business. He had a large circle of friends and acquaintances who will long miss him. His health has been failing for two or three years. Several years ago he had an attack of apoplexy, and about a year since he had another, and the last came last Friday evening, as he was preparing to come to the village with his son. He soon became unconscious and continued until about midnight, when he expired, leaving desolate a home and causing bitter sorrow to those who loved him so. Rev. E. J. Whitney and wife, of Castile, came down to attend the funeral, returning the same night on account of a press of work.

Mrs. Mary Malette, who came home to attend the funeral of her uncle, Mr. Geo. Dauchy, is ill at her father's, threatened with pneumonia. Dr. Burbank attends.
