## WARNER W. EDICK DIED AT MOHAWK

Was of Revolutionary Ancestry— Successful as a Contractor and Builder.

Mohawk, June 30.—Warner William Edick, aged 71 years, died at his home in Walnut street last evening following an illness of less than a week. Bronchial pneumonia was the cause of death and Mr. Edick's passing came as a shock to those who had seen him actively engaged in work a week ago. He had resided in Mohawk six years and he had always made this part of the county his home. He came of one of the oldest families in this county. John Michael Edick came from Germany and settled near Fort Herkimer long before the Revolutionary War. He had lot 33 and this lot remained in the family possession many years. His grandson, Michael, was born in 1734 and served as captain in the Revolutionary War. Warner Edick was a direct descendant of this branch of the family. He was born June 17, 1842 at Fort Herkimer and learned the carpenter trade when a youth.

Mr. Edick for many years conducted a lumber mill about four miles south of Mohawk on Fulmer Creek and then moved to Little Falls, where he lived 30 years. In Little Falls and Mohawk Mr. Edick conducted contacting and building operations and was a successful business man.

He was a member of the Universalist Church of Little Falls and a member of the Royal Arcanum Lodge. He is survived by his wife, who was Ella Hoke of Stark before her marriage, one daughter, Mrs. Edith Corp of Herkimer and a son, Francis Edick of Mohawk. The funeral will be held from the late home Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock, the Rev. C. [Charles] E. Bingham of Herkimer officiating.

Despite his age Mr. Edick was a young looking, active man and engaged in business until a few days before his death. In Little Falls he was especially well known and respected as in Mohawk, where he resided during the past six years. Mr. Edick had already made a large circle of acquiantances and friends and the community feels a distinct loss in his passing.
