## SHOCK WAS FATAL TO ABBIE C. FISH Stricken on Sunday, October 29th She Failed to Rally and End Came Peacefully, Early Friday Morning—Funeral Sunday

Last Friday morning at 4:30 o'clock, occurred the passing from life for Mrs. Abbie C. Fish, aged 87 years, at her home, Vine Cottage, in Putnam Avenue, this village.

Keen of intellect and with a sense of humor possessed by few, Mrs. Fish enjoyed life fully. She was a great reader and retained many choice bits of verse to impart to her friends. She was young in spirit and enjoyed having young folk about her. She was active in her home until Sunday, October 29, 1933 when she was stricken with a shock of paralysis [a stroke] from which she never rallied, although everything possible was done and the best of care lavished upon her by family and friends.

The writer knew her as a kind, helpful friend and one ready to assist whenever and wherever possible. Hers was a dominant spirit that bowed to none and asked few favors, yet she was ever ready to welcome her home [to] any of a large circle of friends and acquaintances.

Abbie Collins Fish was born in Independence township on February 23, 1846, daughter of Daniel F. and Rebecca Wood Collins. Soon after the close of the Civil War (on Nov. 25, 1866) she was united in marriage to Ransom Fish, "my soldier boy," as she expressed it, and to them were born three daughters and one son. Mrs. Fish was the last of a family of seven children.

She is survived by the following children: Mrs. Etta Spicer, Beach Hill, Editor W. D. Fish of Coudersport [PA] and Mrs. Ruhama Patterson of Akron, O., besides a number of grandchildren, great grandchildren and great-great-grandchildren, also nephews and nieces.

The funeral, held Sunday, Nov. 5, 1933, at 2 p.m., from the late home, was attended by a large number of friends. Interment was in Rural Cemetery in the family plot, Rev. Clara Morgan of Cohocton [Universalist] officiating and Fred Wildman, directing. Grandsons served as pall-bearers.

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
