Her remains were taken to Moravia for interment, where a sermon was preached by a Presbyterian minister. May God in infinite mercy, sanctify this loss to the good of all concerned: to her husband, adopted daughter, and friends; and may they, in faith and virtue, find that power which bids grief be still and teaches that 'the Lord will not cast off forever.'
