Eugene Harvey Garland

Eugene Harvey Garland, son of Mr. and Mrs. Horace H. Garland, died at his home on Leatherstocking street Wednesday following a short illness, aged 23 years. Mr. Garland had recently purchased the Stone Jug Pool room and had many friends. He is survived by his parents, two brothers John H. and Horace H., and three sisters, Mrs. Gay P. Blessing, Mrs. Lloyd [Dorothy] Dunkleburger, and Mrs. Harold B. Fuller. Mr. Garland was a member of the Universalist church and of the American Legion. The funeral will be held from his home Saturday afternoon at 2:00 p.m., with burial at Hartwick Seminary, the Rev. Charles Kramer officiating. The American Legion will have charge of the burial service.

Eugene Harvey Garland

Eugene H. Garland, son of Mr. and Mrs. Horace H. Garland, died at his home at 20 Leatherstocking street on Wednesday night, after an illness of about five weeks' duration with leukemia, a condition of the blood which causes great increase in the number of white corpuscles.

Eugene Garland recently purchased the billiard parlor on Main street, formerly operated by Westley Knowlton. He was born on November 9th, 1888 in New York city, where he resided until about twelve years ago. Since that time he has traveled throughout the west and southern states.

At the outbreak of the war he tried to enlist three times, but was refused on account of impaired eyesight. Finally, however, he succeeded in being accepted in Co. D, 31st infantry, of the regular army at San Francisco, California, and served with the American Expeditionary Forces in Siberia and Russia from August 13th, 1918 until December 22d, 1919. His military record was perfect, both during and after actual service. He was an active and enthusiastic member of The American Legion, and was held in high esteem by all the members of that organization.

He is survived by his mother and father; by three sister, Mrs. Gay P. Blessing of Johnson City, Mrs. Floyd [Dorothy] E. Dunkelberger of Lansing, Michigan, and Mrs. Harold B. Fuller of Owego, N.Y., who is a trained nurse and attended him throughout his illness; and by two brothers, John H. Garland of Brooklyn and Horace Garland of Cooperstown.

The funeral will be held from the home of his parents at 20 Leatherstocking street on Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock, the Rev. Charles Kramer [Universalist] officiating. Services at the grave will be conducted by the American Legion.
