DEXTER MAN DIES SUDDENLY

Charles W. Gleason, Aged 65, Victim of Heart Trouble

Dexter, June 13.—Charles W. Gleason, aged 65 years, one month and seven days, died at his home in the Leonard and Gilmore block, Wednesday morning at 8:30, following an illness of three days.

The death was very sudden as Mr. Gleason had always been in the best of health. The only time that he complained of feeling ill was Sunday when he said that he was being troubled with his kidneys.

He had been living alone with his son, Gordon F., for the past several months in the block. When he arose this morning at 8 to call his son he appeared in the best of condition. About 8, the neighbors in the block were attracted by his loud breathing.

They called Dr. Foote, but before the doctor arrived, Mr. Gleason had expired. Dr. R. F. Gates was summoned and he pronounced the death due to heart trouble and kidney trouble.

Mr. Gleason lived in this village nearly all his life, coming here when a child. He had been employed as a painter and glazier. He was up until the time of his death employed at the V. A. Sullivan Lumber Company at Watertown. He also worked for Binninger & Strainge in this village. His wife died last October.

He is survived by five sons, Edward, Harry J., and Dory K., of Watertown, and John J. and Gordon F., of this village; one brother, John, of Wisconsin.

The funeral will be held from the late home Friday afternoon at 3, Rev. Harry Westbrook Reed [Universalist] of Watertown, officiating. Interment will be made in Dexter.
