Byron Scott Greenman

Byron Scott Greenman, formerly of Utica, died at his home in Watertown at an early hour Tuesday morning, having been stricken with apoplexy at 6 o'clock the evening previous. He was born in Hamilton, July 15, 1853, the son of William and Helen Scott Greenman. Later he lived at Bridgewater and for a few years resided in this village with his aunt, Mrs. Myra Scott Hubbard, then in Utica, where for a number of years he was a traveling salesman with J. M. & C. B. Crouse, with Head & Winston and later with Johnson & Murray. In 1894 he removed to Watertown, and for a number of years continued to travel for Johnson & Murray. Then he went to work for the American Tobacco Company. He was well known among traveling salesmen and had a high reputation among business men. He was a member of the Masonic fraternity and had many friends throughout the state.

[On] October 26, 1887, Mr. Greenman married Carrie Vose Pierce of Utica, who survives, although she had just undergone a serious surgical operation. He leaves two sons, Lieut. Wm. Garrett Greenman of the battleship Nevada, now with the American fleet, and Harold Burt Greenman of Buffalo; a daughter, Helen Scott Greenman of Watertown; a brother, George H. Greenman of Utica, and an aunt, Mrs. Myra Scott Hubbard of this village.

The funeral was held at his late home in Watertown Thursday afternoon at 3 o'clock.

#### SON FAILED TO ARRIVE

Lieut. Greenman Unable to be Present For Father's Funeral

The funeral of Byron Scott Greenman was held at 3 Thursday afternoon from his late home, 1020 Academy street, Rev. Harry Westbrook Reed, pastor of All Souls' Universalist church, officiating. Interment was made in Brookside cemetery.

It was hoped that Lieutenant William G. Greenman, U.S.N., would arrive on the train at 4 p.m. and for this reason a short delay was permitted at the cemetery. The officer did not come, however. It is thought that he will not now come to this city.
