Charles Hackett, Civil War, Erie Veteran Claimed Retired As Conductor After 37 Years Service. Funeral Tuesday/

Charles E. Hackett, 86, died at his home, 10 Washington street, Saturday evening. He was well known in the city and had a host of friends. During the Civil war he served in Company A, 189th New York Volunteers (infantry). He was an employee of the Erie railroad for 37 years. He retired as a conductor in 1912.

Mr. and Mrs Hackett celebrated their 65th wedding anniversary on last December 26th. Mr. Hackett was, at the time of their marriage, a resident of Oxford, N.Y. Mrs. Hackett was formerly Miss Perlina A. Powell of the Swale, near South Canisteo. They were married at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Miles Powell. At the time of their marriage, Mr. Hackett had just received his discharge from the army.

They began their married life on the Swale. Three years later they moved to Hornellsville where they spent practically all the rest of their married life. They resided in the home on Washington street, where Mr. Hackett died, for 52 years.

Besides his widow Mr. Hackett is survived by three sons, J. Murray Hackett of Washington, D.C., Roy M. Hackett of 41 Armory place, this city, and Earl C. Hackett of Babylon, L. I.; one daughter, Mrs. Jesse C. Smith of this city; three grandchildren, Mrs. Philip Arlene Angell of Pontiac, Mich., Mrs. Ruth Whitford of this city and Philip Hackett, also of this city; two great-grandchildren, Jerome Whitford of Hornell and Barbara Lois Angell of Pontiac, Mich., and one brother, William Hackett of Elgin, Iowa.

Mr. Hackett was a member of the First Universalist church of Hornell, a member of the O.R.C. and of Doty Post, G.A.R.

Funeral services will be held at the late home, 10 Washington street, tomorrow at 3:30 p.m. Dr. William T. Manning Todd will officiate and will be assisted by the Rev. Clara Morgan of Cohocton. Burial will be made in Hope cemetery.
