SUDDEN DEATH OF MRS. H. HOPKINS

Heart Disease Removes and Estimable Resident of the Eastern District

Mrs. Hannah Hopkins, of 131 Hooper street, E.D., dropped dead last night, at 9 o'clock, of heart failure. She had always been very healthy, weighing almost two hundred pounds, and her sudden decease was a sad and unexpected shock to her many friends and relatives.

Mrs. Hopkins was born at Greenwich, Washington county, N.Y., on December 12, 1829, and thus was in her sixty-first year. Her maiden name was Cozzens and she was of good Quaker extraction. She was next to the youngest of a family of ten children. In 1851 she was married at Newport, R.I., to J. [James] Bayard Hopkins, of Brooklyn, and since that time she has lived continuously in this city and in the eastern district. She was always an ardent worker in all charitable movements, and in connection with the aid societies of All Souls' [Universalist] church she was always prominent and a great source of strength to these organizations. She was in every way an estimable woman, of strong moral character and sweet, loving disposition. She was for a number of years connected with the industrial school and here her labors were not in vain.

Besides her husband, she leaves a family of three sons, all married. William, the eldest, is superintendent of the Williamsburgh post office, while Samuel and John are engaged in business in the eastern district. The funeral services will occur to-morrow night at 8 o'clock and will be conducted by Rev. Dr. J. Coleman Adams, the pastor of All Souls'. The interment will be at Greenwood on Monday and private.
