Death of Rossman Husted

Rossman Husted, a well known Grand Army man of this city, died early Sunday morning at his home, on Union street. His passing away will be deeply regretted by all who knew him, as he was a genial whole-souled man, a good neigh-[line omitted] who knew him. The greater part of his life was spent in this city, and it was from here that he went to become a volunteer when the call came for troops in the 60's. After his service as a soldier he was appointed a member of the New York fire department, but had prior to that had been a member of old Eagle No. 2 of this city, now H. W. Rogers Hose Co. No. 2. He served twenty years as a fireman in the New York city department and was retired on a pension. He returned to Hudson again and made this city thereafter his place of residence. He will be greatly missed among his associates, and they will mourn the loss of a tried and true friend. He is survived by his widow [Hattie Miller Husted]. The funeral will be private on Wednesday afternoon.
