## DEATH OF HENRY HULME One of Hudson's Well Known Citizens Passes Away.

In the death of Henry Hulme there has passsed to the *Great* Beyond one who was a well known Hudsonian, and who during his life long residence in [the] city made many friends here who will regret to hear of his death in early middle life. Mr. Hulme had been in poor health for over a year, but he had been confined to his bed but for two weeks by his fatal illness. His illness was considered serious, but not critically, and this morning he expired quite unexpectedly.

He was the son of the late Job and Charlesworth Hulme, who were natives of England, but had lived here many years. Henry inherited some of the characteristics of his mother who was known as "Mother Hulme" through her kindness to everyone. When the mother passed away and was seen no more in the confectionery and bakery, it seemed but natural for Henry to take her place, for he had been there since a boy, and like his mother he had a pleasant word and a cheerful greeting for all, and young and old were happier when they left his presence, for he was of those that make everyone feel better.

He is survived by a brother, Charles Hulme, and two sisters, Mrs. Henry R. Barringer and Mrs. Fred R. Townsend, all of this city. He was a member of Hoysradt Chemical Co. No. 8.

He was an uncle of Miss Cornelia Hulme, whose tragic death occurred last week, but the final summons came without his having any knowledge of the event, for the niece was a favorite with him and in his condition it was deemed advisable to keep the sad news from him.
