JAS. M. HUNGERFORD DIES NEAR ADAMS
Former Well Known Merchant Passes Away at "The Maples," Aged 82 Years

Adams, July 31—James M. Hungerford, a former resident of Adams, died at the home of his sister, Mrs. Laura Littlefield, at her home "The Maples," near Belleville, Sunday morning, aged 82 years. He had been ill for a long time, and for some time had been at Watertown, coming to Belleville a few weeks ago.

Mr. Hungerford as a young man was a purser on boats on the Great Lakes, and then conducted a mercantile business here for many years, in partnership with Mr. Arms, under the firm name of Arms & Hungerford. He had lived in Toronto for a number of years prior to his death, where he was a manufacturing chemist, moving from there about a year ago to Watertown. His wife died about one year ago, and was buried in Elmwood cemetery here.

Mr. Hungerford leaves two brothers, Amasa Hungerford of "The Maples" and Anson of Rural Hill, and one sister, Mrs. Laura Littlefield; also an adopted daughter, Mrs. Wayne Hadcock of Watertown.

He was a member of Rising Sun Lodge No. 234, F. & A.M. of Adams; of Adams Chapter No. 275, R.A.M.; of Watertown Commandery No. 11 R. and of Media Temple, A.A.O.N.M.S.

The funeral will be held from the home of his sister, "The Maples," near Belleville, the Rev. Harry Westbrook Reed [Universalist] of Watertown officiating, and burial will be made in Elmwood cemetery at Adams.

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
