FRANK B. INGRAHAM

Frank Benjamin Ingraham, formerly of West Hollow, died early Sunday morning, January 4, 1942, at the home of his niece, Mrs. Robert Morrow, in Bristol Valley, where he had resided for the past few years. He would have been eighty-two years old on January 6, 1942. He was born in Naples, a son of Zenas and Emily Lamphier Ingraham.

"Frank Ben" was prominently identified with the affairs of this region for many years. He resided on his farm in West Hollow, where he raised diversified crops and specialized in fine Jersey cattle, and also engaged extensively in lumbering and sawmill operations. He was active in musical circles as a singer and as a violinist. He was the first master of South Bristol Grange No. 1107, and also was active in social and temperance work.

Some years ago, Mr. and Mrs. Ingraham relinquished their strenuous life and moved to Canandaigua, where they resided until her death in December, 1938. Before her marriage, Mrs. Ingraham was Mary Parker.

Mr. Ingraham leaves one sister, Mrs. Esther Pierce, of Bristol Springs, and several nephews and nieces.

Services were held on Tuesday at 2:00 p.m. from the Morrow home, the Rev. Harry Wright, of the Bristol Universalist Church, officiating. Burial was made in Rose Ridge cemetery, Naples.
