Frank G. Jarvis, eldest son of the late Frederick T. Jarvis, and for many years one of the best known farmers at Flycreek, died at his home at Hartwick Seminary, Thursday evening, aged sixty-two years. Mr. Jarvis had been in ill health from stomach trouble for some time but only for the past three weeks has his condition been alarming. On Saturday he suffered two hemorrhages of the bowels and he failed rapidly thereafter. Death is attributed to ulceration of the stomach. The funeral services were held from his late home on Sunday at 1:30 o'clock. The Rev. E. [Edward] A. Perry of the Universalist church at Cooperstown officiated, and the interment was at Flycreek. Mr. Jarvis' active life was almost entirely passed at Flycreek, where he was one of the best known farmers until recently when he removed to Hartwick Seminary. He was a veteran of the civil war, having served as a member of the Third New York volunteer cavalry and he was a member of Turner Post, G. A. R., at Cooperstown. He has held town offices in the town of Otsego and was secretary for at least twenty-five years of the Otsego County association of Universalists. He was a devoted member of the Universalist church at Flycreek and dies respected by all who knew him. He was twice married, his first wife being Lucy Gibbs of Flycreek. His second wife was Mrs. Louisa E. Lindsay, to whom he was married Nov. 5, 1905, who, with three sons Charles E., of Hartwick Seminary, Edwin M., of Flycreek, and Henry K. Jarvis, of Neapolis, Ohio, survive him. He leaves also his aged mother and three brothers, C. B., Ira S., and J. W. Jarvis, all of Hartwick Seminary.
