THE LATE WELCOME S. JARVIS Funeral Services Held at His Late Residence Last Evening

The funeral of Welcome S. Jarvis was held last night at his late home, 187 Hancock street, the services being conducted by the Rev. Dr. J. C. Adams, pastor of All Souls' Universalist Church, of which Mr. Jarvis had been a member. Dr. Adams was assisted by the Rev. Dr. Almon Gunnison, former pastor of the church, and an old friend of Mr. Jarvis, who came from his present charge at Worcester, Mass., to attend the funeral of his friend. Their references to the life and services of Mr. Jarvis were eloquent and touching in the extreme. Robert Roughsedge and Miss Booth of All Souls' Church choir sang appropriate selections. Especially noticeable were the floral tributes; they filled half of the parlor where the body lay and many had to be placed in the room formerly occupied by the deceased. A large number of friends gathered to pay their respects to his memory, for he was a man of many friends.

Mr. Jarvis died on September 8 at Cornwall, N.Y., after a brief illness from intestinal trouble. He was born in Brooklyn forty-three years ago and was educated in the old Wilson street school, later entering Columbia College, from which he graduated with high honors. He afterward studied law in the office of Martin & Smith and was admitted to the bar twenty-five years ago and became a member of the firm which some time later became Duer, Strong & Jarvis. Mr. Jarvis was a man of keen insight and a sound and careful lawyer. He was a member of the Union League Club. Mr. Jarvis was a nephew of James W. Smith of the Eastern District. He was widower and is survived by his mother, two sons and a daughter. The burial took place today in the family plot in Greenwood.
