Funeral Friday for Ernest Kellock, 68

Ernest Kellock, 68, of 1003 Harrison street, Watertown, died November 20, 1956, at the House of the Good Samaritan, Watertown, where he had been a patient since Monday afternoon. Death was attributed to a cerebral hemorrhage with which he was stricken that afternoon.

The funeral will be at 10:30 Friday morning at the Cleveland Funeral home, Watertown, the Rev. Dr. Harold H. Niles, pastor of the All Souls Universalist church of that city officiating. Burial will be in North Watertown cemetery.

Surviving him are his wife, Mrs. Pauline E. Keyes Kellock; two sons, Robert W. Kellock, Watertown and Richard K. Kellock, Syracuse; four grandchildren, David E., Robert E. and Susan J. Kellock, Watertown, and Lynn Richard Kellock, Syracuse, and a brother, Oscar L. Kellock, Rochester.

Native of Watertown

Mr. Kellock was born March 6, 1888 in Watertown, a son of William J. and Matilda Murray Kellock. He was educated in the public schools there and after leaving the Watertown High school, also attended the Northern Business college, now the Watertown School of Commerce.

On November 9, 1909 he married Miss Pauline E. Keyes, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Mosley Keyes of Watertown.

In 1910 Mr. Kellock moved to Rochester with his wife and her parents. During the seven-year period he lived in that city, he operated a grocery store for a short time and then was a chauffeur for a Rochester man.

Joins Family Firm

Mr. and Mrs. Kellock returned to Watertown in 1917, joining his father and brother, Oscar L. Kellock in Kellock's Laundry, Inc. He became secretary and treasurer of it when it was incorporated in 1920. His father was the president and his brother, vice president. Mr. Kellock remained with the firm until 1937, when the business was sold by his father's estate.

Local Resident

Subsequently, Mr. and Mrs. Kellock moved to Sandy Creek to the home on North Main street now owned by Attorney Howard Ledden, where for about two years he was identified with a chicken business. They then returned to Watertown, where Mr. Kellock was employed in the office of the Baldick Coal company.

In 1940, he became a salesman for Marcy-Buck & Winslow, Inc., which became Mary-Buck & Schuyler in 1945, and he had since remained with the firm.

Known in musical circles for his fine tenor voice, Mr. Kellock had sung in the choirs of various Watertown churches. He was a member of All Souls church. He frequently appeared with choral groups in cantatas.

Prominent also in bowling circles, Mr. Kellock had bowled in the City leagues, the Church league and in the Automotive Bowling Pin league. He had been awarded a number of bowling trophies.

He participated in the American Bowling Congress tournament held in Syracuse in 1935 and won distinction by rolling a triple of 634 in the singles event, high among competing bowlers from northern New York.

Mr. Kellock was also a member of the Lincoln league.
