DIED SUDDENLY IN STREET Harry C. Kilian Was Attacked With Cerebral Hemorrhage.

Saturday afternoon about 1:30 o'clock, Harry C. Kilian, an advertising man who was well known in Gloversville, died very suddenly on Genesee Street, Utica, in front of Wicks, Hughes & Co.'s store. Mr. Kilian, who resided at 29 Clinton place, left home in the afternoon and walked down town. He was evidently unwell when he reached the Winston building, and when in front of the office of Dr. H. G. Jones he went upstairs to see him. Dr. Jones was not in, and Mr. Kilian turned away and went downstairs, staggering from side to side. John Bailey had followed him up the stairs, also looking for Dr. Jones, and he noticed as he came down that Mr. Kilian was unwell. On reaching the street Mr. Kilian pitched forward on his face. Dr. C. R. Weed was passing and ran to his aid. He saw that nothing could be done and that life was nearly extinct. Mr. Kilian was taken into the store of Wicks, Hughes & Co. and Coroner Dodd was summoned. In consultation with Dr. Weed the coroner decided that death was due to cerebral hemorrhage.

Mr. Kilian was born in Albany, June 11, 1855, and was educated in the public schools. He went to Utica 18 years ago and was engaged in the advertising business. He was at one time connected with the Sunday Journal, and later took charge of the Utica directory. He was a member of the [Universalist] Church of the Reconciliation, and also of the Commercial Travelers' Benevolent association of Utica, Commercial Travelers' Mutual Accident Association of America and Fireside Council, No. 82, Home Circle. He married Mary T. Snyder in Albany. She survives with a son, Dewitt, and a daughter, Bessie, of Utica; also two sisters, Mrs. Strain and Mrs. Lockwood, both of whom reside in Albany. Today Mrs. Kilian will receive about \$150, the sum to which she is entitled through her late husband's membership in the Commercial Travelers' Benevolent association.
