SABERNA FORSYTH LAMORE DEAD

Aged 85 Years—Had but Recently Moved Here from Colerain,  
Massachusetts—Member of Pioneer Settler's Family—Ill Five Weeks

Following a five weeks' illness of heart trouble and the infirmities of old age, aggravated by an attack of influenza suffered six years ago, Saberna Forsyth Lamore passed out from the earthly life at her home in this village, Monday morning, Oct. 20, 1924 at the age of 85 years.

Saberna Forsyth, daughter of Guy and Nancy Chapin Forsyth, original settlers in this section, was born at Greenwood, N.Y., but the family in a short time moved to the homestead near Independence now owned and occupied by Oscar A. Potter and family. In 1856 she married Lorenzo Ensworth of North Bingham and to them were born four children, all having preceded the mother in death. The family lived on South Hill, Shongo, Goodland, Ind., where Mr. Ensworth died. In 1887 while here superintending erection of the old iron bridge in Main street near Deck's garage, replaced last year by the present structure, John E. Lamore met Mrs. Ensworth and won her hand in marriage and took her to New York, where until fourteen years ago when they moved to Colerain, Mass., they resided.

Deceased was a member of the Universalist church here.

Mrs. Lamore knew sorrow and pleasure in full measure but whether in sunshine or shadow she was as true as steel and leaves many sincere and sorrowing friends to mourn her demise besides the husband, sister Mrs. Maria Jacobs, a stepson Albert Lamore of New York and a stepdaughter, Mrs. Emma Rhodes of Astoria, L. I.

The farewell services directed by Fred Wildman and Dr. Wm. E. Manning Todd officiating were held yesterday, Wednesday, October 22 at 2 p.m. from the late home. Interment in Rural Cemetery.

She has passed on but her memory lives in the hearts of a host for the good and noble deeds she performed while in the flesh. The News feels the loss for she was a staunch friend and patron always.

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
