## Purl G. Light Found Dead

The people of this village sustained a shock when it was learned Friday morning that the body of Purl G. Light had been found in his Chevrolet roadster, near Weatherbee's Mills, Richfield Springs, frozen stiff, having doubtless been there since the previous day, as he had not been seen alive since that time and several persons had seen the car standing there and supposed it was not occupied, as he had slumped down in such a way as not to be seen by a casual observer of the car. He had left home Wednesday morning and was last seen Thursday in Harold Brockway's garage at Richfield Springs.

Mr. Light was born at the old Light homestead in Burlington May 2, 1874, only son of Alonzo and Helen Lucinda (Haight) Light. When quite young he married Miss Nellie Dingman, who survives him. For ten years he made cheese at the Pleasant Valley cheese factory, then bought a farm in that locality where they lived for 12 years, and two years ago last March they came to this village where they have since lived, and he was engaged in threshing, hay pressing, etc. He had exceptional mechanical ingenuity.

Besides his wife [Nellie Dingman Light], four children survive him, LaVerne of Cooperstown, Mrs. Charles Ainslie of Twelve Thousand, Mrs. Geo. Curry and Mrs. Ralph Neal both of this place. Also the following sisters, Mrs. Everette Hotaling, Schuyler Lake; Mrs. Harry Robbins, Richfield Springs; Miss Aetna Light, Warren, and Mrs. Charles Andrus and Mrs. Claude Hinds of Richfield.

The funeral was very largely attended Monday at 2 p. m. at the Universalist Church, conducted by Reverend Geo. Boorn, pastor of the church, the Masonic fraternity having charge of the burial service. Interment was made in the village cemetery.

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
