## Mrs. Ethel Livermore Dead at 83

Mrs. Ethel M. Spicer Livermore, 83, of 1216 Washington street, widow of George W. Livermore, died at 7:45 p.m. Saturday in the House of the Good Samaritan. She had been admitted at noon after suffering a cerebral hemorrhage. She had suffered a coronary atack in 1951, but had recovered enough to be active.

The funeral will be Wednesday at 11 a.m. at the Cleveland funeral home with Rev. Thomas J. Carlisle, pastor of Stone Street Presbyterian church, officiating. Burial will be in Brookside cemetery.

Friends may call at the funeral home from 2 to 4 and 7 to 9 p.m., today and Tuesday.

Surviving are a daughter Miss Jennie A. Livermore, at home; a half brother Monroe Schrodt, Calcium; three grandchildren whom she brought up when their mother was ill: Mrs. Otto (Alice A.) Schultz, Richmond, Va., Mrs. Alan (Dora M.) Wilmot, Cornwell Heights, Pa., and George F. Livermore, Carthage, all children of Floyd E. Livermore; and six great-grandchildren.

Mrs. Livermore was born Dec. 17, 1884 in Watertown, daughter of Sylvester and Harriet Soules Spicer. She had lived in Smithville until she was nine years old. Her father having died, her mother was married to Martin Schrodt in 1895 and the family lived in Calcium.

On June 15, 1904 she was married to George W. Livermore, a native of Livermore Corners in the town of Hounsfield, at the Schrodt home in Calcium. Rev. W. G. Rogers, then pastor of the First Baptist church, officiated.

After their marriage, Mr. and Mrs. Livermore lived in Watertown. He operated a store at 1214 Washington street and sold groceries, feed and flour for 38 years. He died of a heart attack in the store on Oct. 7, 1942, aged 63.

The couple had three sons, all dead. Harold F. died Nov. 6, 1928, aged 21; Bert G., Aug. 9, 1950, aged 41; and Floyd E., Oct 10, 1957, aged 51.

Mrs. Livermore was a member of All Souls Universalist church, Unity Rebekah lodge, Triple Link Circle, Past Nobel Grands, and the Past Noble Grands Association of Northern New York.
