SERGEANT D. L. LOCKWOOD DIES
ON EVE OF DISCHARGE FROM ARMY

Local Boy Victim of Pneumonia at Camp Upton.
Through Active Service in France for Period of Eighteen Months.

Returning from France after nearly 18 months of active service with the American Expeditionary Forces, Sergt. First-class Demetrius L. Lockwood of 741 Maryland av. died Wednesday evening at Camp Upton, Long Island, on the eve of his final discharge from service. While being transferred from Camp Merritt to Camp Upton, Sergt. Lockwood contracted a cold which developed [into] pneumonia. He had been back in the United States less than two weeks.

Sergt. Lockwood was 26 years old and the son of Mr. and Mrs. Luther S. Lockwood of 261 Baker av. He was a graduate of Syracuse University with the class of 1916 and prior to his enlistment in August, 1917, was employed in the Engineer's Department of the H. H. Franklin Manufacturing Company.

He was first attached to the government arsenal at Watertown, Massachusetts and later to that at Watervliet, N.Y. In November, 1917, he was ordered overseas with an ordnance unit and from the time of his arrival in France was kept with the Fifth army in the Toul and St. Mihiel's sectors and in Lorraine. With Salvago Squad No. 5 he participated in the great drive against the Germans toward Sedan. Following the signing of the Armistice last November Sergt. Lockwood was kept busy clearing away wrecked ordnance material on the battlefields.

Besides his parents Sergt. Lockwood is survived by his widow, Mrs. Grace Tobey Lockwood, an infant daughter and a sister, Mrs. Bruce Hunter of Syracuse. The funeral arrangements have not yet been made.
