MISS CORA V. LUTTENTON

The death of Miss Cora V. Luttenton of Albion occurred on March 5, in the Arnold Gregory Memorial Hospital, in her seventy-seventh year. She had been in poor health for several months. For many years she had been a diabetic patient but this condition did not prevent her from occupying a large place in the life of Albion and in the affection of her many friends.

She was born in the town of Barre. Following her graduation from the Brockport Normal School in 1890, she taught school at Pompey, DeRuyter and Tully. Her next position in this profession was in Albion where she became district superintendent of rural schools in Orleans County. In this latter position, she had a career of distinction. She was the teacher of the Albion Training Class for many years and one of the greatest joys was in the continued contact with these teachers whom she in former years had trained. As a teacher in the church school of the Pullman Memorial Universalist Church in Albion, she likewise served a large group of young people over the years who never forgot how much they owed in life values to Miss Luttenton. She became a member of the Universalist Church in Albion in 1899 and was always a devoted and loyal member. She was a member of the Daughters of the American Revolution, the Albion Historical Club and the Albion Chapter of the Eastern Star.

The Rev. J. Murray Gay, pastor, conducted the funeral service at the Grinnell Funeral Home in Albion on Sunday afternoon, March 7. She is survived by two brothers, William J. Luttenton and Homer W. Luttenton of Albion, three nephews and two nieces.
