Tribute is Paid to A. K. Marean by His Friends  
Delegations From Several Groups Mourn at Services  
MAINE IS REPRESENTED  
Beautiful Adventure Forecast by Rev. Haynes at Church

"Our friend, Allyn K. Marean, has just started on the greatest, the most beautiful adventure of his life." the Rev. Harold W. Haynes declared at funeral services for the late first deputy county clerk at the First Universalist church, 131 Front street, this afternoon at 2 o'clock.

"Think of him as making his way along the trail in a new country, with thoughts of those he loves and those who love him filling his heart; half choosing here, half choosing there, and at last finding a spot that satisfies, and settling down, a citizen of that new country; serving that new community with the faithfulness with which he has served this community here and preparing a home for those who love him, which they shall share some day when they have joined him there."

The services were simple, following the ritual of the Universalist church. Delegations attended from the Broome County Bar association and Binghamton Lodge, 177, F. & A. M. County Clerk William E. Flook and representatives were present from the county clerk's office while other county offices and fraternal and welfare organizations with which he had been associated sent delegates. Among the mourners were a large number of residents of Maine, his native town.

The service opened with recitation of a poem by Mr. Haynes, and then followed scripture, remarks by the pastor, another poem, prayer and benediction. In the course of his remarks Mr. Haynes said:

"The last enemy that shall be destroyed is death," says the Apostle Paul in that magnificent passage from Corinthians: "magnificent in the intense earnestness of the faith which inspires it, but a faith that differs much from our present knowledge of Nature and her laws.

"The man who has arrived at a reasonable view of death, will not trouble himself much about a special preparation for its coming. Rather he will hold himself always ready, seeing he knows not when the summons may come to him to depart. He will live each day as though it were his last, and yet he will not live otherwise than if he had a thousand years before him, as I believe he has; because in either case his chief care will be to spend his time profitably."
