Death of John Munsell

CENTRAL SQUARE, Jan.11—John Munsell, forty-five years old, a former resident of the town of West Monroe, died in the Waterloo hospital Sunday morning from blood poisoning in his feet, both feet being amputated to save his life.

Mr. Munsell is survived by his wife and four children; his mother, Mrs. Mary Munsell of this village; a sister, Mrs. Josephine Rogers of Cicero, and a [step] brother, Charles Gillens of this place.

The body was shipped here Monday evening, being removed to E. L. Wood's morgue. The funeral will be held at Mr. Wood's undertaking parlors at two o'clock Wednesday afternoon, the Rev. Julia M. Tobey [Universalist] officiating. Burial will be made in Hillside cemetery.

—John Munsell, who purchased the Walter H. Morehouse farm in Junius, was found on Dec. 29th with both feet frozen and was brought to the Waterloo Hospital, as was reported at the time. He was in such a condition that gangrene developed and it was necessary to amputate both legs just below the knees. He was so weaken[ed] that pneumonia developed and he died early last Sunday morning. Deceased was 49 years of age and had been living on his farm alone. His remains were sent to Central Square, N.Y., where he leaves a wife and four children, besides his mother, Mrs. Mary Munsell. His funeral was held on Wednesday at E. L. Wood's undertaking rooms, Rev. Julia M. Tobey officiating, and burial was in Hillside cemetery.
