JAMES C. NICKASON

Death from Cerebral Hemorrhage of Well Known Mail Carrier

Last Friday morning James C. Nickason, of No. 5 Maple street, the well known mail carrier, was stricken with cerebral hemorrhage, rendered unconscious and remained in that condition until his death last evening just before midnight.

He was a well known veteran of the Civil war. He went out with the Seventy-fifth New York Volunteers, and was wounded at the Battle of Port Huron, the wound crippling his left hand so it was useless. He was a member of Seward-Crocker post No. 45, G.A.R. He was appointed to the force when Auburn was first given mail carriers and served in that capacity for 23 years, retiring five years ago to private life. He was a member of the National Association of Letter Carriers.

Mr. Nickason's many friends, and he had a host of them, will be pained to learn of his death; he was a patriot, a man of high ideals in morality and endeavored in his lifetime to live up to his plane of character, in which he was eminently successful. To his family will come the sympathies of the community.

Besides his wife, Mrs. Cornelia Nickason, he is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Frank A. Smith of this city [and] Mrs. H. J. Loomis of Geneva, N.Y., and one son, Frank J. Nickason of this city. Two brothers, residents of Auburn, also survive, William H. and John M. Nickason.

Funeral services will be held at the house Friday afternoon next at 2:30 o'clock, Rev. A. [Arnold] S. Yantis officiating. Burial will be made in the family lot at Soule cemetery.

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
