DEATH OF THOMAS A. OSBORN

Passing Quietly Away After a Long and Tedious Illness

Thomas A. Osborn, an old and highly respected resident of this city, died at his late home, 23 Lewis street, yesterday afternoon, after a long and tedious sickness. For the past year he has been in feeble health. Mr. Osborn removed his family from Massachusetts to Auburn eighteen years ago, and has since resided in this city. He was an honest, industrious man and won the respect and esteem of all who knew him. At one time he was foreman of the shoe shop in the prison, a position he held for years. He was a prominent member of the Universalist Church and always in his pew except when forced to remain home through sickness. He was a veteran of the late war and did good service for the preservation of the Union. He leaves, besides a loving wife, three children, Mrs. D. Morris Kurtz of Brooklyn, William E. Osborn, of the reportorial staff of the New York World, Charles Osborn, of this city, besides one sister, Mrs. George Barber of Genesee St. The funeral will be held at the family residence tomorrow afternoon at 4 o'clock and will be conducted by J. J. Bartholomew. The remains will be taken to Winthrop, Maine at 6:50, where final interment will be held.
